Description	<p>Description</p> <p>End-of-terrace three-bay three-storey bank, built c.1880. The façade is finished in rusticated granite at ground floor level, with brick to the upper storeys, granite sill courses and granite coping to the parapet. The south elevation is rendered as is the exposed section of the east elevation. Bracketed eaves course to the south elevation. The roof is hipped and slated. The entrance is located on the curved north-west corner and consists of a panelled timber door with further timber panelling and a segmental-headed fanlight above, all set within a semi-circular arched recess with decorative moulded keystone. The windows to the ground level are semi-circular headed and have one over one and two over two timber sash frames, all set into recesses similar to the entrance. A former window opening to the west elevation now houses an automated teller machine. There are small ventilation roundels set between the heads of the ground floor windows. The windows to the upper floors are flat-headed with plain timber sash frames. The name 'Bank of Ireland' is spelt out in gold painted incised lettering above the ground floor windows, with c.1990s projecting bank signage at either side of the entrance, and the bank's emblem above the corner window to the first floor. The building has a street frontage.</p> <p>Appraisal</p> <p>This typically solid looking bank has largely escaped any serious corporate makeover. Its elements of Renaissance styling sit well with the nearby Roman Catholic church and all-in-all it remains a valuable asset to the streetscape.</p>

Description	<p>Description</p> <p>Terraced three-bay two-storey shop, built c.1890 but probably containing the fabric of an earlier building. The façade is finished in painted render with moulded giant order pilasters, sill course and a parapet with central semi-circular pediment, finials and pronounced coping. The pitched roof is covered in artificial slate. To the ground floor is a full-width timber shopfront with glazed door set within a curved glass reveal. Over the shopfront is a canopy which extends almost the full width of the footpath, and is supported on plain timber posts with simple timber segmental-headed arches between, creating an 'arcaded' effect. The upper floor windows have segmental heads and replacement uPVC frames. c.1980s raised lettering to the pediment. The building has a street frontage.</p> <p>Appraisal</p> <p>Distinctive late Victorian shop, with curved glass entrance reveal, which adds variety to the streetscape.</p>

	<p>Detached seven-bay double-height Renaissance Style church, built 1861 to designs by Patrick Byrne. The building is finished in ashlar granite to the front north façade and squared rubble granite elsewhere; transepts to south end of the east and west sides. Side porches and rear vestry rooms change the plan from cruciform to 'T'-shaped. The north front façade has three double timber doors with plain surrounds, blocking courses and projecting cornices. A central bay projects slightly and rises above the cornice line to merge with a short bell tower with domed roof, which in turn is surmounted by a stone cross. Plain giant order pilasters to the ground and first floors to the front north façade with pilasters with ionic capitals to the tower. Windows generally have semi-circular headed openings with multiple-paned timber sash frames with margins. Venetian windows to transept gables. The pitched roof is finished with slate and cast-iron rainwater goods. The church is slightly set back from the cast-iron railings with square granite gate pillars. It is set in the town centre at a corner overlooking the Parade Ground. The interior is well preserved and in good order. Heavy decorative plaster to the coffered barrel-vaulted ceilings. Vatican II reordering has been carried out with a plain modern altar, ambo and sedile set in front of the original altar; the altar rails have been removed.</p> <p>Appraisal</p> <p>A fine Renaissance Revival style church of 1861 which has an imposing slightly elevated setting overlooking the Parade Ground. Despite Vatican II reordering the interior has little altered its original state.</p>

The arrangement is protected with a wrought-iron railing.</p> <p>Appraisal</p> <p>A fine romantic memorial statue of 1898 commemorating the role of Fr. Michael Murphy during the 1798 uprising which has an imposing setting overlooking the Parade Ground.</p>

To the east side of the building is a small single-storey section which abuts the neighbouring building. This section is fronted in ashlar limestone with a tall parapet obscuring the roof. The front elevation of this section contains a deeply recessed door with moulded surround and keystone, with decorative brackets supporting a relatively plain entablature. Cast-iron rainwater goods. The building has a street frontage with small areas in front bounded by part decorative cast-iron railings set on low limestone walling.</p> <p>Appraisal This attractive finely executed Queen Anne Revival style bank is one of Arklow's most outstanding buildings, and though somewhat dwarfed by taller properties to either side it is of enormous value to the streetscape.</p>
